- Climate: Subtropical with temperatures regularly in the high 20s and early 30s (degrees Celsius). The dry season is from December to May, while the wet season is from June to November. It can rain at any time but it typically only lasts for a short duration during the dry season.
- Languages: There are about 10 different languages spoken in Belize, however the majority speak English, Spanish and Creole. English is the official language due to the fact that the country was once a British colony. You are likely to hear Spanish in the north (close to Mexico) and west (close to Guatemala), and Creole in all parts. Mayan languages, on the other hand, tend to be used by indigenous natives in the south.
- Airport: Philip S. W. Goldson International Airport (BZE) is the only international airport in Belize, located just outside of Belize City in Ladyville. Direct flights are available from several major US cities such as Miami, Houston and Los Angeles. Of course, you can also fly directly from other nearby countries like Mexico, Guatemala and El Salvador.



Travel Tips

BELIZE HAS A SUBTROPICAL CLIMATE AND IS A VERY EASY GOING AND LAID BACK PLACE. THERE IS NO NEED FOR FANCY JEWELRY, CLOTHING OR SHOES.

WHAT TO BRING?

- You'll be most comfortable in casual, light clothes.
 You may want to bring something for cooler evenings, when the winds blow stronger.
- For the jungle, bring lightweight trekking shoes and lightweight outdoor trekking clothes.
- In terms of bugs, sometimes they're bothersome.
 Wear repellent, especially at dawn and dusk and bring at least one long sleeve shirt and long pants if you are sensitive. Skin so soft oil seems to be very helpful for sand flies or no-see-ums.

BELIZEAN CUSTOMS

 Belizeans are genuinely kind, and friendly. To remain in good graces, do respond to a smiley face or a gentle "hello" or other greeting such as a 'good morning' or a 'what's up?' It is important to be patient, as Belizeans find joy in taking time to chat, and they exude a 'not in a rush' kind of vibe.

CURRENCY

- The currency of Belize is Belize Dollars which is pegged against the US Dollar at 2:1. So 2 Belize dollars = 1 US dollar. US dollars are accepted everywhere.
- Be sure to ask whether prices are in US or Belize dollars! ATM machines are available in all towns. The ATMa only give Belize dollars.

TRAVEL TIPS CONTINUE...





- Belize's climate is considered to be subtropical, with a cool nonstop air stream flowing over from the Caribbean Sea and a mean temperature of 79 degrees Fahrenheit. Belize has only two seasons; the dry and wet seasons.
- Dry season is December to May. March can get a little windy and April to June are the ultimate months for sun and very minimal amount of clouds in the sky.
- The wet (rainy) season runs June through November and while the early months can still be spectacular times to visit, some mainland attractions such as caves and jungle treks are sometimes closed due to the dangers of exploring outdoors when wet. In the height of the summer months the coast can get extremely hot and humid.
- September and October are the prime time for tropical storms which are rear. Hurricanes are ever rarer.

HEALTH

 No vaccinations are required for entry into Belize, although a few are recommended including chicken pox, hepatitis A and B, measles, tetanus, diphtheria and typhoid. If traveling to jungle destinations, consult your doctor on whether they recommend malaria tablets. Pharmacies are prevalent in tourist destinations and generally well equipped.
